“ *Aunt Anne Goodman Eaton is the last of a generation. She married my Uncle Joseph Andrew Eaton at Hobson Methodist Church. Uncle Joe and Aunt Anne encouraged me in my youth to get an education. I modeled my life after them as they did not drink or smoke nor did they curse. Uncle Joe Eaton was descended through four generations from Amos Eaton and Elizabeth Ramsey Eaton who came to Nashville in the spring of 1780 and built Eaton's Station on the Cumberland River. Amos and Elizabeth had sons named Thomas and Joseph. Joseph was killed by Indians and Thomas named one of his sons for Joseph. Joseph and Elizabeth Dudley Eaton had a son named Andrew Jackson Eaton. Uncle Joe was named Andrew for him and Joseph for his father. Aunt Anne Goodman Eaton was eligible for membership in the Daughters of the American Revolution.
